


<p>History <u>World War 2</u> Pupils will learn about a dramatic turning point in British history, which remains within living memory. They learn about plans to invade Britain and investigate the causes of Britain's victory over Hitler's Luftwaffe in The Battle of Britain. They explore what life was like for people on the Home Front during the Blitz and compare different experiences of bombing, blackouts, evacuation and rationing. Pupils will encounter examples of wartime propaganda and censorship and analyse these.</p>	<p>Computing <u>Web page creation</u> Pupils will learn and understand the key components of a web page layout, devise their own web design with clear navigation structures and recognise the implications of linking to and using content owned by other people.</p>	<p>Science <u>Electricity</u> Pupils will learn to: associate the brightness of a lamp or the volume of a buzzer with the number and voltage of cells used in the circuit; they learn how to compare and give reasons for variations in how components function, including the brightness of bulbs, the loudness of buzzers and the on/off position of switches; and finally, they use recognised symbols when representing a simple circuit in a diagram.</p>	<p>RE <u>What can be done to reduce racism?</u> <u>Can religion help?</u> Pupils will study beliefs, identities, values and commitments in religion and worldviews in ways that challenge and confront racism and prejudice.</p>

Suggested Learning Opportunities at Home:

- Research WWII and create an illustrated timeline of events.
- Create a model of an air raid shelter.
- Design a WWII themed game.
- Create your own propaganda poster.
- Write (and create) a dinner menu for your family using only the ingredients available during rationing.
- Compare your life with that of a child during WWII and present this in your own way.
- Imagine you have been evacuated. Write a diary entry or a letter home to your parents.
- Write a biography on a significant individual from WWII.
- Research Anne Frank and create a fact file about her.
- Bake/cook a wartime recipe.
- Create a thought-provoking piece of WWII themed artwork.
- Perform a WWII play for your family or friends – you could film this too!
